Mont Sutton was born of the dreams of Harold Boulanger, a local farmer and avid wilderness skier. Located in the Eastern Townships, Sutton is one of the largest ski resorts in Quebec and the northeastern United States. The resort, which opened on December 17, 1960, continues to evoke a charming, family-oriented atmosphere

while offering a top level skiing destination. Skiing has existed in Sutton on the north side of Lac Mohawk since the 1930s, but it was in the mid-1950s when members of the Boulanger family rode their first mechanized ski lift in Stowe, Vermont, that their love for the sport took off. Although the resort still offers original homey chalets and a centre-pole chairlift, the focus on hi-tech lifts, snow-making and glade skiing makes it a popular sporting destination for skiers and snowboarders. After four generations of the Boulanger family and five decades in operation, Mont Sutton continues to attract winter sporting enthusiasts from across Canada.
